Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

Statement of intent

Our aim is that all pupils, regardless of background or challenges faced, make good progress and achieve high attainment in all subject areas. The focus of our pupil premium strategy is to support disadvantaged pupils to achieve that goal, including appropriate progress for those who are already high attainers.

We will carefully consider the challenges faced by vulnerable pupils, such as those who have a social worker and young carers. The activity we have outlined in this statement is also intended to support their needs, regardless of whether they are disadvantaged or not.

High-quality teaching is at the centre of our approach, with a clear focus on areas in which disadvantaged pupils require the most support. This has been shown to have the greatest impact on closing any disadvantage attainment gap and at the same time will also benefit non-disadvantaged pupils in our school. Implicit in the intended outcomes detailed below, is the intention that non-disadvantaged pupils' attainment will be sustained and improved alongside progress for their disadvantaged peers.

Our approach will be responsive to both the common challenges faced by larger groups of pupils and also individual needs, informed by diagnostic assessment methods and analysis, not assumptions about the impact of disadvantage. The approaches we have adopted complement each other to help pupils excel. To ensure they are effective we will:

- ensure disadvantaged pupils are challenged in the work that they're set
- act early to intervene at the point need is identified
- adopt a whole school approach in which all staff take responsibility for disadvantaged pupils' outcomes and raise expectations of what they can achieve

Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	Assessments, observations, and discussions with pupils indicate underdeveloped oral language skills and vocabulary gaps among some disadvantaged pupils. These are often evident from Reception through to KS2 and can be more prevalent among our disadvantaged pupils than their peers.
2	Assessments, observations, and discussions with pupils suggest disadvantaged pupils can have greater difficulties with phonics than their peers. This negatively impacts their development as readers.
3	Internal assessments indicate that maths attainment among some disadvantaged pupils is often below that of non-disadvantaged pupils. This gap can remain steady to the end of KS2.

4	<p>Our assessments and observations indicate that the education and wellbeing of many of our disadvantaged pupils have been impacted by partial school closures to a greater extent than for other pupils.</p> <p>This has resulted in significant knowledge gaps leading to some pupils falling further behind age-related expectations, especially in maths.</p>
5	<p>Our assessments, observations and discussions with pupils and families have identified some social and emotional issues for pupils, notably due to a lack of social interaction and enrichment opportunities. This was exacerbated during school closure. These challenges particularly affect disadvantaged pupils, including their attainment.</p>
6	<p>Attendance data indicates that attendance among disadvantaged pupils has been between significantly lower than for non-disadvantaged pupils in the most recent period.</p> <p>Data also indicates that some persistent absentees are disadvantaged children. Our assessments and observations indicate that absenteeism is negatively impacting disadvantaged pupils' progress.</p>

Intended outcomes

This explains the outcomes we are aiming for **by the end of our current strategy plan**, and how we will measure whether they have been achieved.

Part B: Review of outcomes in the previous academic year

Pupil premium strategy outcomes

This details the impact that our pupil premium activity had on pupils in the 2020 to 2021 academic year.

What did we aim to achieve?

Objectives –

1. Improving Attainment and Progress

It is our aim that by the end of the academic year 2020-21:

- The attainment gap between pupils in receipt of PPG and other pupils is no larger than 10% in reading, writing and maths in all year groups
- The attainment gap between pupils in receipt of PPG and other pupils in reading, writing and maths in year 6 is closing rapidly
- The attainment gap between pupils in receipt of PPG and other pupils in reading, writing and maths in year 2 is closing rapidly

2. Parental Support and Engagement

It is our aim that all parents of children in receipt of pupil premium are fully engaged with the school and are supporting their child's learning by:

- Attending parent consultations and open afternoon events
- Actively supporting their child at home with home learning activities and reading support
- Ensuring their child has good attendance of 96% or above where possible

3. Improving Pupil Learning Knowledge and Resilience

It is our aim that pupils in receipt of pupil premium will improve their:

- Ability to talk with confidence about their learning and next steps
- Engagement with teacher feedback
- Learning resilience and perseverance

4. Opportunities and Enrichment

All pupils in receipt of premium will be provided with wider opportunities for social, emotional and cultural development through funded access to enrichment opportunities. It is our aim that through these opportunities pupils in receipt of pupil premium will improve their:

- Self-confidence and self-view
- Social and team working skills
- Independence and problem solving skills
- Experience of the wider world

Our internal assessments during 2020/21 suggested that the performance of some disadvantaged pupils was lower than in the previous years in key areas of the curriculum. Despite working well in previous years, the measures we aimed to implement during the pandemic were not able to be applied as effectively, primarily due to the impact of COVID 19. This resulted in several outcomes not being fully realised.

Our assessment of the reasons for these outcomes points primarily to Covid-19 impact, which disrupted all of our subject areas to varying degrees. As seen in many other schools across the country, school closure was most damaging to our disadvantaged pupils, and they were not able to benefit from our pupil premium funded improvements to teaching and targeted interventions to the degree we had intended. The impact was mitigated to some extent by our ability to maintain a high quality curriculum, including during periods of partial closure, which was aided by use of our remote education package including materials provided by Oak National Academy and live lessons delivered through Microsoft TEAMS.

Improving parental support and engagement was particularly difficult to achieve across 2020-21. This was especially difficult in our rural location with internet and equipment issues. Our work to improve social and team working skills was also significantly impacted.

Attendance has also been significantly affected for many children during the pandemic and this is also true for our disadvantaged children. This meant that our target for parents to ensure 96% attendance for our disadvantaged children has not universally been able to be realised.

Our assessments and observations showed that pupil wellbeing and mental health (and to some extent behaviour) were significantly impacted last year, primarily due to COVID-19-related issues. The impact was particularly acute for disadvantaged pupils. We used pupil premium funding to provide wellbeing support for all pupils, and targeted interventions where required. We are building on that approach with the activities detailed in this current plan.
